


Summer proved to be a good time for getting together with friends and not having to worry about homework.

Girls had a chance to participate in a Homecoming game of their own. It was the powder-puff football game.


Thursday night the bigger than life bonfire blazed brightly as the mood of Homecoming filled the air.


Friday at the assembly a warm welcome was given to Honorary Boilermaker, Mrs. Reedene Hamm, a good friend and familiar face to all KHS students.

As a finale, the Homecoming dance was attended by many students as a perfect ending to a perfect Homecoming.











"Sound of Five" provided the music for dancing.





Running around in circles is what some Kewanee girls were doing this spring. These girls are members of the KHS Track Team.


The girls this year really had guts. The team ran against some really tough teams such as Sterling and Princeton.

A Young Squad But Good


This year's golf team, led by standouts Rick Nance, Steve Osborne and Larry Standaret, had a successful season.







About 15 freshmen were called for double duty to help out the small sophomore team. Of the 15, about 6 started and the others at least played.




Mighty Matmen





With a fine group of juniors returning, and excellent underclassmen, Kewanee should be a top contender in the NCIC.






Girls Carry Out Winning Tradition





Mr. Blucker is director for our band this year. He has been well accepted by students and is extremely talented in the field of music.









Future Farmers Have Come a Long Way




I can remember when a farmer meant wearing white socks and short pants. Farmers have come a long way. They now are members of a very popular growing club at KHS called FFA.

FFA sponsors countless activities throughout the year. This year, FFA sponsored the Homecoming Bonfire which has been sponsored by Student Council in the past.




Drama Speaking






Government Club


Touchy issues had to be dealt with throughout this year. The extreme amount of vandalism and the never ending war between Kewanee and Wethersfield were among them.







Rule the School




The English Language






Freshmen **Follies**

The Class of '79 has spirit and shows it.








