## Experimental Period a Success

Having a basic knowledge of the English language is a necessity in our society. Therefore, every school must offer English classes in its curriculum. At KHS students were required to take five semesters of English grammar and literature and one semester of speech. Most college-bound students took English IV, which is a class designed to prepare students for a freshman rhetoric course. In addition to the required English courses, World and Contemporary Literature were offered.

This year was the end of an experimental period for the English department. The class of 1981 was the first class to complete a new three year grammar program in Kewanee High School. Through this program students were able to achieve high grades on the Grammar Mastery Test. With the wide variety of English courses available at Kewanee High School, students were able to greatly improve their English skills.

Besides voting on government offices, Illinois students were also able to vote on a state animal. The winner at Kewanee High was the white-tailed deer with 133 votes.
